2022 ELECTIONS & VOTER REGISTRATION

Although we just completed the Consolidated General Election this past April, in 2022, we will have primaries in the spring and the General Election on November 8, 2022 for Governor, the State Legislature, and Congress. Currently, the primary date has not yet been set. If you want to vote in these 2022 elections and avoid the last-minute rush, now is a good time to make sure you are registered.

DO YOU NEED TO REGISTER TO VOTE? If you are not registered, have just moved into the Township, have moved to another residence in the Township, or changed your name, you need to register to be able to vote in the 2022 elections. Registering to vote has never been easier or more convenient. You can register online, in person, or you can download registration forms and register through the mail. Below is information on all the ways:

1. Register to Vote at Wheeling Township. You'll need two forms of identification (one showing your current address), to be a citizen

of the United States, be 18 years of age or older by the primary election date in 2022, and have lived in the Township for at least 30 days before the election. For naturalized citizens, you must prove the date of your naturalization.

2. Register Online. If you have an Illinois driver's license or state ID, you may register online at www.cookcountyclerk.com/agency/register-vote. If you do not have a driver's license or state ID, go to the same website and complete the form online, print, sign and mail it to the address on the application. If you register by mail, you must bring a valid state issued picture identification when you vote for the first time.

Voting: 1) it is your democratic right; 2) Representation drives change; and 3) Every vote counts. Be sure you're registered to vote.

2021 COOK COUNTY ASSESSOR APPEALS

The next opportunity to appeal the 2021 assessed value of your property is with the Cook County Assessor. At the time this newsletter went to press, Wheeling Township's open date had not yet been determined. On the Cook County Assessor's website (www.cookcountyassessor.com), you can find the calendar, as well as sign up for email updates.

Our office can assist in finding comparable properties for an online appeal (the preferred method). Contact our office at 847-259-1515, or email taxinfo@wheelingtownship.com. Please include the PIN number (found at top of the tax bill) in the subject line and name and address in the body of the email. We will send a list of comparable properties and instructions for the online Appeal Portal on the Cook County Assessor's website.

If you are unable to file an appeal online, you may fill out an appeal form and we will enter it electronically *on your behalf.* Appeal forms are available in our office, or can be found in the red info box located outside the Township building near the rear entrance. Please leave the signed, completed form in the black drop box near the rear entrance, under the portico. Additionally, you can find all forms on the www.cookcountyassessor.com website.

2020 Second Installment Property Tax Bills were tentatively scheduled to be mailed in early July; however, they may be delayed to the end of the month. Updates will be posted on the Wheeling Township website.

If you do not receive your bills, a copy can always be found on the Cook County Treasurer's website www.cookcountytreasurer.com. Property tax bills can be paid by mail, or in person at any Chase Bank. You will need an original or a duplicate tax bill. Payments can also be made at www.cookcountytreasurer.com with no fee from a bank account. Please review your bill carefully for appropriate exemptions. If an exemption is missing from the bill, you may file a "Certificate of Error" at www.cookcountyassessor.com to obtain a refund.

The Chicago and Skokie Assessor's offices have reopened for in-person visits, by appointment only.

WHEELING TOWNSHIP ROAD MANAGEMENT...

Help Keep Drainage Ditches Clean and Flowing...

The unincorporated areas of Wheeling Township use ditch and culvert systems to handle drainage. They are designed to collect and transport surface water runoff from road pavement, private storm drainage lines, and adjoining lots with swales. To function properly, these ditch and culvert systems depend on mutual Township and property owner cooperation. The Township is responsible for maintaining drainage pipes that convey water under roadways and the storm water basins they drain into.

Residents in the unincorporated areas of the Township are responsible for their driveway apron and the culvert that runs beneath it. This means it's the homeowner's responsibility to keep their driveway culvert pipe clear of obstructions, which allows storm water to flow freely. Assuming it's done frequently, water pressure from a garden hose or the use of a leaf blower should be sufficient to clear a culvert of debris. Lawn clippings and leaves should be collected and removed. If lawn waste or landscape debris becomes packed, a contractor with more powerful "jetting" equipment may be needed.

Residents who reside in unincorporated Wheeling Township are responsible for maintaining the lawn in their ditch(es). It's recommended to rake out lawn clippings and leaves, and remove trash, brush and weeds on a weekly basis.



Maintaining proper grass covering in the ditches is vital in order to prevent soil erosion and the transport of sediment downstream (which could accumulate and clog culverts and drainage pipes).

This mutual Township and resident cooperation will ensure that the entire drainage system operates at its maximum capacity for the benefit of both you and your neighbors, and help keep costly drainage system and road repair costs to a minimum.

WHEELING TOWNSHIP FOOD PANTRY

A Return to Pre-Pandemic Client Shopping

We're pleased to announce that the Wheeling Township Food Pantry returned to its pre-pandemic "Client Choice Model" of shopping on June 1, 2021. Throughout the entire pandemic, the Wheeling Township Food Pantry never closed its doors! Rather, safer methods of food distribution were adopted. From mid-March, 2020, to the end of July, 2020 – while information regarding how the COVID-19 virus could be transmitted was constantly changing – pre-packed bags of food were provided to those in need. Starting in August, 2020, a hybrid method was used; which asked recipients to choose desired items from a list and wait while a volunteer food pantry crew member packed it for them.



The hybrid method remained in place until our return to Client Choice Shopping on June 1, 2021. In preparation for our clients' return, safety precautions were put into place, such as a plexiglass shield for the "cashier," a hand sanitizing station, and signage to remind recipients to keep a safe social distance from others while shopping. A new area for bagging groceries after shopping was also established in order to avoid congestion at the checkout desk.



Wheeling Township's ability to remain open and productive throughout the pandemic can be summed up in one word: Community. Last year, during May, June and July, the Pantry experienced an enormous increase in distributions (over 50% more than during those same months in 2019). A 'distribution' refers to a household, which may be comprised of one or more persons. While distributions increased



during that time, what was more significant was the increase in the household/family size requesting the food. Thankfully, community donations poured in to rescue thinning shelves and prevent them from being left bare. Community is also what kept the food pantry working physically, with the dedicated volunteer food pantry crew continuing to come in to work their weekly shifts. Community is additionally reflected in the relationship the Wheeling Township Food Pantry has with the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD), which used grant funding to waive food purchase costs during the pandemic! GCFD partners with Township staff to provide SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly called Food Stamps) applications online to residents unable to apply on their own. Because no pantry distribution alone is enough to sustain a family, SNAP benefits are a vital part of fighting food insecurity.

During 2020, there were 4,978 pantry distributions overall. Those distributions fed 11,746 people, of which, 2,836 were children. The largest age group using the pantry is over 62, representing 41% of the total visits. *Thank you to the entire community for the support.*

Fresh veggies and fruits are welcomed by Wheeling Township in the Supervisor's Office Monday through Thursday, from 9:00am until 4:30 pm. Items need not be washed; however, please remove all loose dirt and lingering insects prior to dropping off.

Appointments will be held at Wheeling Township, but participants MUST make their appointments with Schaumburg Township in advance. Call 847-884-0030 to set up an appointment. Walk-ins are NOT allowed.


Free amplified telephones are available to qualified Illinois residents with a hearing loss. To qualify applicants must:

- Be a legal resident of the State of Illinois
- Have their telephone service at the address shown on their application form
- Have a licensed physician, speech pathologist, audiologist or designated DHS/DRS counselor sign the application form certifying the applicant is deaf, hard-of-hearing, Speech-Disabled or Deaf-Blind

Medicare can be complicated... **SHIP Can Help!**

If you are enrolled in Medicare, are close to enrolling in Medicare, or have health insurance questions, Wheeling Township's SHIP Counselors may be able to help you. Our dedicated and knowledgeable volunteers are extensively trained by the **Illinois**



Department On Aging to assist Medicare participants with understanding their benefit coverage, helping with filing medical bills and claims, explaining Medicare Supplemental and Part D Insurance, and providing resolution support for problems.

The annual Open Enrollment period (October 15 – December 7) is coming! We'll begin taking appointments in July for Open Enrollment. Call the Township to set yours up at 847-259-7730.

SHIP counselors can also assist those seniors who qualify for both Medicare and full benefit Medicaid with their enrollment in the Medicare-Medicaid Alignment Initiative, also known as MMAI. With this program you may choose to enroll in a health plan and receive all of your benefits through one MMAI health plan. If you feel you might qualify for MMAI, make an appointment with our SHIP
