2024 ELECTIONS AND VOTER REGISTRATION

For the first time in several years, second installment property tax bills in Cook County are expected to be mailed July 1 and due on August 1, in accordance with state law. If the expectation holds true it may come as a surprise to taxpayers. This is because the due dates in recent years have been considerably later than August 1.

Second installment tax bills cannot be issued until the county's two tax appeal agencies complete the processing of all Cook County tax appeals. But in the last two years, computer compatibility problems between the agencies delayed appeal processing by several months and as a result, second installment tax bills were not due until December.

This year, the appeal agencies made a concerted effort to complete their work earlier and they succeeded in finishing the process of appeals on May 5. Historically, appeal completion dates in early May have left enough time to complete the other steps necessary for bills to be issued on time. Unless there are unexpected delays in the remaining steps in the process, this year's bills should be due August 1.

The budgets of schools and other local governments can be severely disrupted when the tax revenue they rely on arrives four or five months late, as has happened the last two years. And budgets of taxpayers can also be disrupted by unpredictable due dates for tax bills. The expected August 1 due date for this year's second

installment bills will be just eight months after the due date of last year's second installment bills, and during those eight months taxpayers will have paid three property tax bills. This will cause hardship for some.

REGARDING 2024 ASSESSOR APPEALS

We anticipate that Wheeling Township will be open for Cook County Assessor appeals in mid-August.

2024 ELECTIONS AND VOTER REGISTRATION

The November 5, 2024 Presidential, Congressional, Illinois State Legislative and local Judge Elections are only some 5 months in the future. The various political party candidates for President, U.S. Congress, Illinois State Legislative offices, and local judges will be on the General Election ballot. Early voting begins October 21, 2024. Now is the time to make sure you are registered. If you are not registered, have just moved into the Township, have moved to another residence in the Township, or changed your name, you need to register to be able to vote in this election. To register, come to the Township Clerk's Office, Monday-Friday, between 9:00-4:30. All you need are two forms of identification (one showing your current address), to be a citizen of the United States, be 18 years of age or older by on November 5, 2024, and to have lived in the Township for at least 30 days before the election. For naturalized citizens, you must prove the date of your naturalization. If you have an Illinois driver's license or state ID, you may register online through the Illinois State Board of Elections website https://ova. elections.il.gov/. If you don't have a driver's license or state ID, go to https://www.cookcountyclerk.com/agency/register-vote and complete the form online, print, sign and mail it to the address on the application. If you register by mail, you must bring a valid state issued picture identification when you vote for the first time. As always, you can register to vote on Election Day. If you will want to vote by mail, please contact Cook County at https://www. cookcountyclerk.com/agency/vote-mail to request a mail ballot. However, ballots will not be mailed to voters until October 2024.

BECOME AN ELECTION JUDGE AND EARN \$250 - \$400

ELECTION JUDGES Every election in suburban Cook County requires a team of Election Judges and Polling Place Technicians. These poll workers are paid \$250-\$400 depending on the position they work on Election Day. The two positions are as follows:

- ★ Election Judges check in voters, provide ballots, and ensure the polling place runs smoothly. This position usually pays \$250 for an election judge.
- ★ Polling Place Technicians work directly with the election judges to assist voters. Polling Place Technicians also have more responsibility for setting up and maintaining the voting equipment. Due to the additional responsibility, Polling Place Technicians receive more training and higher pay usually of \$400.

Learn about the benefits of Building and Land Use Permits in Wheeling Township's Unincorporated Neighborhoods.

You're invited to attend a free Cook County Building Permit Workshop

At the workshop, you'll meet staff from the Cook County Building & Zoning Department, and learn about the joint Wheeling Township-Cook County Permit process which has been in place since May 25, 2012. Additionally, a Sanitarian from Cook County Public Health will be on-hand to explain the permit requirements for "private" wells and septic systems expansion or replacements.

We look forward to helping you and your contractors with the permitting process, thus avoiding violations from un-permitted work performed by an owner or contractor that's not registered by Cook County Building & Zoning Department.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF PERMITS?

- **1. Permits** *Protect Property Value* Your home or business in a real estate investment. It's important that construction work whether major or minor, interior or exterior, or just repairs to your home or business obtains all necessary permits and land use approval.
- **2. Permits** *Save Money* Property insurers often will not cover work or damages caused by un-permitted work.
- **3. Permits** *Improve Safety* Cook County and Wheeling Township share the goals of protecting public health, safety, and welfare. It's important that your maintenance or construction project, even tree removal and landscaping, meet safety

standards. This activity reduces injury risk to you, family and future owners.

4. Permits Makes Selling Property Easier

When a property is sold, owners or agents often fail to disclose improvements or repairs made. They don't specify if permits were obtained or inspections were done. Some financial institutions won't finance a purchase without permit and occupacy certificate evidence. If you decide to sell a building or land that has been modified without permits, you or the future owner could be held responsible for costs of removal and correction of work performed without permits.

5. Permits — It's the Law

The truth is, it's the law. Permits benefit you and your community. They preserve land use, benefit the environment, and protect the ground and surface.

PROTECT YOURSELF, THE PUBLIC, AND NEIGHBORS

A property owner who can show that permit requirements were consistently and strictly followed (as demonstrated and documented by a governmental agency that has carefully maintained records) has a strong ally.

If property owners, contract purchasers, real estate agents, developers, HOA's, civic associations and contractors apply for and obtain permits using accurate permit documents from experienced design professionals (Plats of Survey, Topographic Survey, Architectural Plans), and require their contractors furnish Bonds & Certificates of Insurance, permit staff can respond much quicker.

Home Delivered Meal Program

If you have concerns about your ability to shop or cook for your-self (or know someone who might need help), consider Wheeling Township's Home Delivered Meal Program. The Township offers a reasonably priced home-delivered hot meal program for residents of the Township who meet eligibility requirements.

How does it work?

A hot, freshly prepared meal is delivered at mid-day, Monday through Friday, right to the door of the recipient by a friendly volunteer. Applicants must agree to receive meals five days a week for at least a month.

What does it cost?

Wheeling Township's program is a self-pay program: The hot meal is \$8.00 per day. A cold meal (which is delivered at the same time) is available for an additional \$5.75 per day. Bills are mailed

monthly for the meals received. The Lutheran Home in Arlington Heights makes the food.

Who is eligible?

- Must be a resident over 60 or permanently disabled individual over 18
- Must reside within Wheeling Township
- Must be considered homebound and/or no longer driving
- · Must not have a full-time caregiver
- There must be availability on a route

SCHOOL SUPPLIES SOUGHT

When families are already on a tight budget, buying backpacks and school supplies for several children is an extra burden. The Ready 4 Success School Supplies Program seeks filled backpacks to be donated to low-income families in Wheeling Township. Families in need will be screened by the General Assistance Department to confirm residency and verify the household income is less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, which is \$5,200 gross monthly for a family of 4.

Donors are asked to use the list below to purchase the supplies and fill the backpack prior to dropping it off at 1616 N. Arlington Heights Road. The approximate cost to purchase and fill a backpack with the contents below is \$100. If you want to donate but are unable to absorb the whole amount, please consider partnering with a friend or neighbor to split the cost. To be fair to all children participating in the program it is important that the contents of all backpacks be the same. **Filled backpacks will be received until Friday, August 2nd.**

HELP TO FILL THE FOOD PANTRY SHELVES

Summertime is challenging for the Food Pantry. With children eating at home for all three meals daily, the need rises, just as food drives connected to school activities or scouting are lost. During the three months of June, July and August, the increase of pantry usage from 2023 compared to 2022 was 78% higher. Since overall usage has increased in 2024, the summer spike is expected to continue. Hunger doesn't take a summer vacation!

Unknown to many is the fact that non-food items are not allowed to be purchased with SNAP benefits. Formerly called Food Stamps, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, can not be used to buy paper & personal essential items needed every day like toilet paper, soap, shampoo, toothpaste, etc. The food pantry has separate shelves dedicated to these items, but they are often empty.

When shopping during the summer months, please consider buying a few extra items for the Wheeling Township Food Pantry. Both food and non-food items are always appreciated. The list below can be clipped and taken with you as you shop.
